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here are many things in this world that divide people, and too many things in the church that divide Christians. It is often surprising to see how mean people can be to one another, even God's own people – those who live in the love of Jesus Christ!

But it isn't all like this. There is a group of people from churches in downtown Mechanicsburg who work together to demonstrate the love of Christ to our neighbors and one another. At our last planning meeting for the October 16th Community Meal, we talked about the following quote and how it reflects why we are doing what we are doing: "Jesus' desire for his believers to be one came from the knowledge that our unity would be a powerful witness to God's love. When believers, who are all different, can live in harmony, people take notice. With all the things that can divide us, our ability to be united through the differences is what will draw others to us – because they want to know why we are behaving in a way that unites rather than divides." (from "Together We Can" by Kelli Jordan)

We are churches from several denominations, churches of varying and differences in theology. But we come together four times a year to put together a yummy meal for our neighborhood, to serve and laugh and hang out with anyone who comes. We don't highlight our differences, we highlight our unity in Christ and our desire to bless others.

As Jesus was preparing his disciples for the day he would leave them and return to the Father, he told them this: "Let me give you a new command: Love one another. In the same way I loved you, you love one another. This is how everyone will recognize that you are my disciples—when they see the love you have for each other" (John 13:34-35, The Message).

Learn and grow with others at Snax n Study, Sundays at 8:45 am


In October and November, the Snax & Study group is looking at several of Jesus' parables from the unique perspective of New Testament Scholar Dr. Amy-Jill Levine. We are using her book and DVD series, "Short Stories of Jesus." All are welcome to join us. If you are able to provide the "snax" from time to time, please sign up on the sheet on the bulletin board in the hallway. The October schedule is listed below.

Short Stories by Jesus" series

(lesson descriptions from leader's guide of book)

Oct 9 - "Lost Sheep, Lost Coin, Lost Son" (from Luke 15) - We will consider what "taking count" of who and what may be lost or missing looks like.

Oct 16 - "The Good Samaritan" (Luke 10:25-37) - We will discover how the narrative frame interprets the story, and be challenged to think concretely about what loving an enemy looks like in today's world.



Oct 23 - "The Pearl of Great Price" (Matthew 13:45-46) - We will compare this parable with Jesus' encounter with a rich, would-be follower in Matthew 19:16-30, and discuss some alternative standards that identify the kingdom of heaven.

Oct 30 - "The Mustard Seed" (Mark 4:30-32, Matthew 13:31-32, Luke 13:18-19) - We will consider how a range of images enhances our understanding of Jesus' teaching, and how to discern when faithfulness to God and God's kingdom involves taking direct action and when it involves patient trust in God's action.

Nov 6 - "The Laborers in the Vineyard" (Matthew 20:1-6) - We will consider the spiritual lessons and concrete levels of this teaching when applied to our own lives.

Nov 13 - "The Widow and the Judge" (Luke 18:1-8) - We will examine biblical images in stories of widows, and consider what can be gained when rejecting stereotypes in favor of viewing and engaging with people as individuals.

Nov 20 - The Enthronement Psalms - On Christ the King Sunday, let's focus on the reign of God. The enthronement Psalms (90 - 108) give voice that there is a millennia of us connected to the promise and hope that God will ultimately reconcile God's people and reclaim his creation.






Give a ride to church


Streets of Treats - October 15

Why Do We Sing in Church?

During Sundays this past summer, "Hymn Sing on the Spot" gave folks opportunities to request favorite hymns. I enjoyed learning about the hymns you like best and, in conversations with some of you over those weeks, hearing about the moments and memories that make these tunes and words special to you. [And I wrote down all the hymn titles that were requested through the summer so I can refer back to them the rest of the year.]

That we all relate to hymns and have at least one favorite - or maybe even many - got me thinking about music in worship and the shared experience of singing hymns. Here are some thoughts from a church musician blog I follow (Dr. Adam Lefever Hughes, St. Peter's Lutheran Church, Lancaster): * Singing a text helps us to remember it. The words we sing in hymns

are poems set to music. * Words set to music is a powerful memory tool, one that we use to hand down the Christian story. * By raising our voices collectively in song, we proclaim our faith together. * Singing together is a communal action, in stark contrast to a culture that idolizes the efforts of individual. * When we join our voices together in song, we proclaim God's word of grace to each other and the world. * When we sing, we become the body of Christ. We do not point to ourselves; it is Christ whom we adore.

Snax n Study:

The Psalms: Planting the Words of Scripture in Our Hearts

Did you know that the book of Psalms is unique from all other books in the Bible? Most scripture "speaks to us" while the Psalms "speak for us". The Psalms, varied in style and content (from hymnic praise and rejoicing to thanksgiving and even laments and complaints in times of distress and perplexity), show us people addressing God (Out of the Depths: The Psalms Speak for Us Today). Let's discover new connections to our God through the poetry, imagery, prayers, songs and praise of God's people across centuries in these words of the Psalms. THIS IS NOT A SINGING CLASS.
