hen I was a child, my mother loved to watch the daily soap opera, "The Days of our Lives." I could hear the opening from any place in the house where I was playing with toys or reading a book --- "like sands through the hourglass, so are the days of our lives." There is truth in that statement. The ticking of the many clocks in my house is a reminder of the passing of time. A reminder that each moment, each day is precious. A reminder to treasure the gift.

The month of November is rich with time. It's not that there are more days or hours in November than any other month, but there are specific occasions during November that remind us that time itself is a precious gift.

Our church year is organized around God's time. We are in the final month of our church year, celebrating All-Saints Sunday, on November 5 and closing out the year on Christ the King Sunday, November 26. On All-Saints we will light candles and pray prayers to remember loved ones who are no longer with us. It can be a bittersweet remembering. A time to hold memories close, to let go of regrets, to anticipate when we will be together again. All-Saints reminds us to cherish and value the people who are still with us. To have those conversations with the living that we wished we would have had with those who have died. Many of you may be like me in this: I wish I could call my mom who was always my cheerleader and ask her about this thing or that, to talk to her over a cup of tea, and enjoy one more hug.

Time is a precious gift that can be easy to take for granted. The older I get, the more aware I am of how fragile life is, how fleeting time can be. It is important to breathe and cherish the gift of each moment of time, important to treasure the simple act of waking up each morning to a new day and thanking God for whatever it will hold. It is important to protect God's gift of Sabbath time, one in seven for renewal in worship, reflection, rest, and to nurture relationships.

I want to encourage each of us, as we close out this year, to be more mindful in each moment, to steward our time well, not rushing through it, but soaking in all the blessings and possibilities of each day with gratitude to God.





Advent Worship

Out of Time - Advent at Trinity on Main

This Advent our worship will be focused on the theme "Out of Time." The texts of our Revised Common Lectionary are pre-occupied with time – the day of the Lord, God's time versus our time, the mysterious schedule of the day and the hour. The lectionary itself interacts with time in unpredictable ways — the gospel lessons skip backward and forward over Jesus' life like someone trying to find the right track on a vinyl recording. One week, Jesus speaks of a day to come, the next week, John the Baptizer speaks of Jesus' coming.

In Advent, past and future collapse into God's present, and the lines blur between Jesus' first and second arrivals. This is chronologically disorienting in a way that seems intentional. God who created time and exists beyond it, is busy within, around, and beyond our human experience of time. God uses our experience of time to meet us, bless us, shape us, and call us into holy endings and new beginnings. God's infinite being and infinite patience cut through our fear as God enters human time to well with us: *Emmanuel*, Godwith-us.

This Advent, we are planning additional time for you to settle in and make 2023 Advent a time of intentional spiritual renewal. Join us for Wednesday Vespers at 7 pm. Sunday Worship will include fresh liturgies, prayers, the lighting of Advent candles, and a special time for children. How will "God-with-us meet you?"

Make sure to bring the kids to worship!
The time of Advent can get crowded with lots of commercial offerings. It is easy to be overwhelmed or push aside the wonder of the birth of Jesus, and our children miss the whole reason for the season. We may get to Christmas and realize that we ran out of time for the most important reason that we celebrate – the birth of Jesus. It is his birthday after all!

And so, we are planning a <u>special focus for children</u> each Sunday morning in Advent. Families can order their own "at home clock" to follow along or make their own! Take-home activities will also be available to keep the conversation going. And children can light the Advent candles each week. Ask Pastor Karen for details.

<u>Weekly devotional resources</u> will be available to you online, or in hard copy to pick up at the church.


Longest Night Worship – December 21, 7 pm

This Longest Night Worship uses the Northern Hemisphere's lengthening darkness to hold space for those who struggle around the holidays. This year, we will use a reverse Tenebrae liturgy that begins with unlit candles on the Advent wreath that are lit throughout the service. Light will slowly seep into the worship time and space, flowing in and around song and scripture, prayer and lament. (These services are sometimes called Darkest Night or Blue Christmas.)

History Corner

Did you know...Our church actually has three cornerstones? The first one is dated 1858 and is in the front west corner of the church. The second one is on the corner of the west end entrance dated 1989. The one recently discovered is above the dropdown ceiling just inside the west end entrance and is dated 1924. It was laid when construction of the back end of the church was begun.

Partners for Sacred Place Conference

Pastor Karen, Stacey Zeller, Deb and I recently had an opportunity to attend a unique and engaging conference in Philadelphia.
Partners for Sacred Places, a national, nonsectarian, non-profit organization sponsored the event. They are dedicated to the preservation, transition and increased community use of older religious properties.

Discussions centered on methodologies used to assess properties and assets, how to make better use of available spaces and resources, and how to increase the usage of those spaces by partnering with community organizations. As a side note, we learned that it is possible (and legal!) for churches to actually rent their spaces, as long as all profit/non-profit rules, regulations and tax codes are followed.

One of the basic premises of Partners for Sacred Places is that not only does a church have historic and architectural value as a landmark, but it also has public value and is important to the community because of its outreach programs and partnerships with local organizations.

Discussions were also held regarding the matching funds program that is offered. For a church that has a particular project that needs to be completed and will enhance service to the community but cannot be accomplished without assistance, this can be a valuable resource to help with that effort. Once accepted into the program, funds raised by the church will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$100,000. Unfortunately, any existing funds the church has prior to acceptance into the program cannot be used.

Overall, the conference was interesting and informative, with a lot of experience and ideas being shared among the other church representatives. However, additional research and conversations will be needed to determine if this program is a good fit for our church.

Funeral Planning & Senior Resources Event Recap

On Saturday, September 23, a group of approximately 25 Trinity members and community friends gathered for a day to discuss resources regarding aging at home or in the care of others, getting end-of-life legal documents in order, and outlining wishes for our, or a loved one's, funeral. Although none of these matters are particularly fun or easy to think and talk about, this day was carefully planned to be an open, comfortable dialogue about these inevitabilities of life, and I would venture to say that we all felt the benefit of participating.

We heard from Pastor Karen Durbin and Melissa Jacoby about what to expect when planning a funeral at Trinity (or most anywhere, really). Suggestions for scripture and music were provided, and Pastor supplied a worksheet that can be completed by an individual outlining their personal preferences for their own funeral so that it may be kept on file at Trinity for when the need arises. This can be such a gift to your family... when that time comes, not only will you have eliminated a number of decisions that they would have to make in a time of extraordinary grief, but your own wishes can be honored in just the way that you would like.

Karen Schmick, chair of our Fellowship Committee, coordinated the lunch for the day, giving us a "taste" of what a funeral luncheon might look like. Matthew Thomsen, member and local family law attorney, spoke about wills, Powers of

Attorney, and estate planning, offering extremely helpful information about the important documents that we should all put into place while we are still able to make those decisions. I offered some samples and insights on obituaries and how gathering personal details and relevant history for your own obituary can be a gift to your family as well.

Finally, representatives from both Messiah Lifeways and Country Meadows came to share information about adult day care, in-home care, and residential care. There are many types of services available at our local facilities, and they were generous in sharing their expertise.

This was a day chock-full of important information, and I thank Pastor Karen, Melissa, Debbie Schue, and members of our Worship and Music Life Ministry for all the work they did to put this event together. Thanks, too, to all of the speakers and local retirement facility representatives who attended. There was a good bit of resource information provided that day... if you are interested in getting copies of anything, including the funeral planning worksheet for Trinity's file, please reach out to either Pastor Karen or Debbie Schue.




