





Advent Worship

Out of Time - Advent at Trinity on Main

Advent worship is focused around the theme, "Out of Time."

We will be considering references to time in our Sunday morning lessons. What does it all mean for us at the end of 2023 and into 2024? Advent "time" is always a bit unusual. Starting at the end and skipping backward and forward over Jesus' life can feel disorienting. But God is always intentional in meeting us. God created time for us and exists beyond it. God is active within, around, and beyond our human experience of time. God uses our experience of time to meet us, bless us, shape us, and call us into holy endings and new beginnings. God's infinite being and infinite patience cut through our fear as God enters human time to well with us: *Emmanuel*, God-with-us.

Advent Sunday Worship will include fresh liturgies and prayers to engage our imaginations, the lighting of Advent candles, and a special time for children.

How will "God-with-us" meet you this Advent? Consider going out on a limb this year. Let go of one or two of your usual "busy things" and devote that time to quiet prayer and intentional spiritual renewal.

Consider adding:

- Weekly Advent Vespers, Wednesdays,
 Dec 3 Dec 20, 7 7:20 pm
- The Longest Night Worship, December 21, 6:30 pm
- A free at home Advent Devotional.
 (Contact the church office for a copy.)

WAIT! WHAT TIME IS IT?

It is easy to be overwhelmed or push aside the wonder of the birth of Jesus, and our children miss the whole reason for the season. We may get to Christmas and realize that we ran out of time for the most important reason that we celebrate – the birth of Jesus. It is his birthday after all!

Bring the kids to Advent worship for a special focus for children called: "What time is it?" Children will gather with pastor, watch her large clock, and then light an Advent candle together.



Longest Night Worship – December 21, 6:30 pm

This Longest Night Worship uses the Northern Hemisphere's lengthening darkness to hold space for those who struggle around the holidays. Just as the secular world ramps up its frenetic merriment in the week before Christmas, Longest Night arrives with a liturgy that protects a window of time for us to set outside the Christmas countdown and acknowledge that we don't and can't always meet the mandate for holiday joy. Sitting in solidarity with others can be a welcome accompaniment to our sadness, grief, or depression -- not to make it go away, but to be together as we wait for God who meets us right where we are.

This year, we are using a reverse Tenebrae liturgy. We begin with unlit candles on the Advent wreath and light them throughout the service. The light will slowly seep into the worship time and space, flowing in and around song and scripture, prayer and lament.

(These services are sometimes called Darkest Night or Blue Christmas.)

Note: We are grateful for the good work of our colleagues at "Barn Geese Worship" for continuing to create creative resources for churches.

History Corner

Most people are aware that Mechanicsburg Mayor George Hummel was a member of our church during the Civil War, but *did you know...*

George Hummel's great grandparents, Frederick and Rosina Hummel, were the founders of (you guessed it!) Hummelstown, PA which was established in 1762! This week's question:
Why do we use blue Advent candles and some other churches use purple?



For a long time, three purple candles were used on Advent wreaths. Purple is a symbol for repentance. Advent, sometimes called a "little Lent," can anticipate Lent, a longer season of penitence, with this color.

Toward the end of the 1900s there was a shift to blue instead of purple. The color blue is associated with hope and royalty, a fitting reflection of a hopeful waiting for the royal birth.

Some churches use four blue candles, and some use three blue and one rose candle. The rose candle was first used as a break in the penitential season of Advent. After the shift to blue, some churches kept the rose-colored candle. At Trinity, we use the rose candle for the third Sunday in Advent -- Gaudete Sunday, meaning "rejoice."


