I discovered the power God's grace holding me in-between the now and what is coming, and through it all, the joy of knowing that I am held firmly in God's heart, even and especially in the painful times.

In her new book, "The Lives I Actually Have," Kate Bowler is giving me words to my pursuit of God's joy in all the in-betweens places of faith. May her words from "for stretching your heart" ¹encourage you too.

Let today be a divine exercise of yes...and.

Yes, I have so much to be thankful for, and this hasn't turned out like I thought it would. Yes, I feel moments of joy, and I have lost more than I could live without. Yes, I want to make the most of today, and my body keeps breaking. Yes, I am hopeful, and this is daunting. Yes, I am trying to be brave, and I feel so afraid.



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So, bless me, trying to live in-between those two words: yes...and.

May I understand this is where the real work of life is found.

Where it takes courage to live.

Where grief can strip me to the studs

and love can remake me once again.

Where my heart can be both broken and keep on beating.

Never sorry to have broken at all.

Lament as "Spiritual 'Discipline'"?

In all of our church hymnals are subsections that appear at the top edge of each hymn page, identifying themes that the verses relate to (for example, categories like: Grace; Holy Baptism; Hope and Assurance; Praise; Witness; Worship, etc.).

The ELCA's hymnal *All Creation Sings* (ACS, 2020) includes - for the first time - hymns in a subsection titled "Lament." Why, *WHY* would we sing in worship of grief, disappointment and our questions to God about suffering and injustice in the world?

Lament enables us to name our sorrow rather than simply pushing it aside because it's challenging or uncomfortable. Coming before God in humility to admit that we cannot always bear the "stuff" of life and leaning on the knowledge that our God can turn letdowns and struggles "into holy joy and renewed hope" (*Sundays and Seasons*, p. 97) can be an expression of deep faith.

The Bible is filled with examples of God's people who struggled - at times argued! - with God about their personal circumstances, the plight of their nations or the seemingly dismal prospects for their futures. Even Jesus, whose obedient steps we retrace and follow in the upcoming season of Lent, voiced his laments and placed them in God's care. May we always be invited and uplifted to do likewise.

Let my spirit always sing, though my heart be wintering, though the season of despair give no sign that you are there, God to whom my days belong, let there always be a song. (ACS #1020, text by Shirley Erena Murray)

Snax n Study:




We are already into Season 3 of The Chosen. Join us Sunday mornings at 8:45 for food and fellowship. The video and discussion begin promptly at 9.

Lenten Worship at Trinity on Main - The Seed of Joy



During Lent, we will be considering what it is like to find Joy during the more somber season of Lent.

Typically, Lent begins with an ashen cross traced on our foreheads – a sign of mortality and sin. We intentionally put our alleluias aside until Easter. We consider what we might "give up" during this season to keep us more aware of God's presence. We assume that joy just doesn't fit into this season. The authors of Barn Geese Worship urge us to watch for joy, to "put aside surface assumptions" and to notice how something beautiful emerges. Something richer and more nuanced than sheer happiness. A joyful Lent is not an oxymoron. As it turns out, joy is right at home during a minorkey season like Lent – and if joy is there, perhaps there are other seasons of life that joy calls home, too. Joy is a beacon that points us toward God's unfailing presence, even in the heart of fear and pain."

Join us as we consider "how joy is planted, tended, nurtured, and nourished by God and God's people". With the help of Barn Geese Worship resources, we will include fresh liturgies and prayers to engage our imaginations and help us grow in faith. 




Why Do They Do That?

Why do they do that?

A new feature of our monthly newsletter is "Why do they do that?" People like you may often wonder about our liturgy, the symbols in our sanctuary, or other random things about Trinity Ev Lutheran Church. This feature will attempt to answer some of your pressing questions.



This week's question: What are those wooden shields on the walls in the sanctuary?

On Sunday, December 7, 1969, a set of "Twelve Apostles' Shields" were dedicated. They were given in memory of Mrs. Lester W. Erb by her husband and family. Leslie Hocker remembers when studying these shields was a part of the confirmation process at Trinity.

The shields are hand painted and polychromed on red backgrounds. They are approximately 10 x 12 inches, and are hung on the walls of the sanctuary. The Gospel shields are on the pulpit side. The Epistle shields are on the lectern side, and the lesser Apostles are on the back wall.

Can you identify the 12 apostles?
Who is on the Gospel side front to back?
Who is on the Epistle side front to back?
Who is on the back wall?

Thank you to a local Facebook friend for posting the picture below from the Mechanicsburg Museum Association.

His post reads as follows:

From the MECH. ASSOC... looks like they're ready to unload the Bell for the Lutheran Church steeple. Note the size of the horses. The working men on the cart are probably the Carter's, who make their living moving different items around town, including items to and from the museum freight station. The man by the front appears to be wearing a Cumberland Valley railroad uniform. The well dressed men are probably from the church. They appeared to be on the grass between the church and the home next-door, with Main Street behind them. (132) East Main St. Mechanicsburg." The house is no longer there.
